

Catholic Theological College is a place of learning and research in a wide range of fields associated with the Christian faith. It offers opportunities for deeper understanding of our faith and for exploring the ways in which that faith can contribute to our contemporary world. Studying at CTC is a chance to be enriched by this reflection, drawing on the Catholic tradition, in a community that is committed to pastoral service of the Church.

The College brings together a stimulating and supportive mix of lay men and women, religious and those preparing for the priesthood, and students are of all ages and backgrounds. At the heart of CTC is the Daniel Mannix Library, which continues to add new scholarly resources to a collection that has been built up over more than ninety years. Its shelves of books and journals are surrounded by open and airy study spaces, which encourage its users to take up and read (*Tolle Lege*), as the College motto suggests.



Studying **Philosophy** will confront you with perennial questions about the human person, the world and God that have fascinated great thinkers for over 3,000 years. It will enable you to engage in rational enquiry and reflection both on the Christian tradition and on contemporary issues that confront us in our secular world.

St Anselm of Canterbury described theology as "faith seeking understanding." **Systematic Theology** studies the great mysteries of the Christian faith, leading us to an ever-deeper appreciation and understanding of the person of Christ.

The discipline of **Biblical Studies** is concerned with the Word of God as the inspired and normative foundation of the Christian faith. The Bible contains the story of divine revelation in human history. To help students discover the enduring relevance of biblical texts, CTC offers a range of units for study towards awards or for personal development.

Christians believe they are called and enlivened by the Spirit of Christ. **Church History** studies how people have sought to put their Christian beliefs into practice and is therefore concerned with spirituality as much as theology.

Undergraduate studies

CTC offers a wide and stimulating program of undergraduate studies in theology and related areas. These studies can be undertaken either for the highly regarded awards of the University of Divinity, or by audit (without assessment or credit) for personal or professional enrichment.

- Courses are available full-time or part-time.
- Some units are available in intensive mode during the midyear break and on some weekends.
- Day and evening classes are available.
- Online options are available from other colleges of the University of Divinity.

The **Diploma in Theology** introduces students to the key theological disciplines of Biblical Studies and Christian Thought and History. This may be extended by further study in those disciplines and in the area of practical ministry studies.

The Advanced Diploma in Theology and Ministry builds on the Diploma in Theology by enabling students to deepen their understanding of the key theological disciplines of Biblical Studies, Christian Thought and History, and Ministry. This is extended by further study in those disciplines and in the area of practical ministry studies.

The Advanced Diploma in Philosophy builds on the Diploma in Theology by enabling students to deepen their understanding through a specialised focus on Philosophy.

Spirituality seeks to appreciate how the Spirit enlivens the Christian. In an age when spirituality is often understood as something eclectic and individualist, unrelated to the Church, the study of Spirituality at CTC opens some of the great treasures of the Christian tradition.

The discipline of **Pastoral Studies** is concerned with applying theological studies to teaching and ministry, and is particularly suited for students who are involved in or preparing for pastoral ministry.

Moral Theology is the area of theology that explores questions about the implications of Christian faith for our lives. It offers an opportunity to reflect critically on the challenges of Christian life and considers moral conscience, the social teaching of the Church, bioethics and human sexuality.

The liturgy has been defined as the "source and summit" of all the Church's activity. The study of **Liturgy** enables students to have deeper insight into the liturgical and sacramental rituals that help manifest the people of God as the Church, the body of Christ.

Bachelor awards

Bachelor of Theology

The Bachelor of Theology critically examines life and faith through the study of scriptures, theological traditions and historical contexts. It aims to broaden self-understanding and facilitate cultural engagement. The Bachelor of Theology assists students to develop knowledge across broad areas of theology and deeper knowledge in particular areas of interest. It develops research and communication skills, and prepares graduates for further theological study.

Successful completion of Year 12 in an Australian secondary school, or a University of Divinity advanced diploma or equivalent

Normal duration

3-9 years

The Bachelor of Theology and Bachelor of **Ministry** is a dual qualification. Students enrol concurrently in the Bachelor of Theology and the Bachelor of Ministry and are awarded two degrees on completion of the course of study. Students are able to complete the dual qualification in four years (full-time) or equivalent (part-time).

Bachelor of Ministry

The **Bachelor of Ministry** prepares students for the practice of ministry. It establishes foundations for ministry through the study of scriptures, theological traditions, and historical and contemporary contexts. It requires concentrated study in ministry praxis. The Bachelor of Ministry provides a foundation for graduates to understand and articulate their identity and place in the world.

Entrance requirements

Successful completion of Year 12 in an Australian secondary school, or a University of Divinity advanced diploma or equivalent.

Normal duration

3-9 years

The Bachelor of Theology with the Bachelor **of Arts** allows a candidate who is concurrently enrolled in the Bachelor of Theology at the University of Divinity and a Bachelor of Arts at an Australian university to obtain up to 144 points towards the Bachelor of Theology on completion of the Bachelor of Arts.



Postgraduate coursework degrees

The wide range of postgraduate studies available at CTC makes further study in theology and philosophy accessible to students with varying undergraduate backgrounds and diverse interests.

Graduate certificates

The **Graduate Certificate in Theology** qualifies students in theological study by developing or deepening their knowledge and skills in theological disciplines.

The Graduate Certificate in Biblical Languages allows students to acquire knowledge of one or more biblical languages and skills for the analysis and translation of passages in languages such as Hebrew and New Testament Greek.

The **Graduate Certificate in Research Methodology** is a postgraduate award for students preparing for a higher degree by research.

Graduate diplomas

The **Graduate Diploma in Theology** allows students to explore areas of interest in theology.

Masters degrees

The Master of Theology (Coursework) is an advanced degree in theology for students with an undergraduate degree in theology or ministry.

The **Master of Theological Studies** is an advanced postgraduate award for students with a tertiary award in another area. It enables students to lay sound foundations in selected theological disciplines and to deepen their engagement and skills in selected areas of theological study.

The Master of Education and Theology enables students to apply advanced knowledge of the nexus between education and theology in professional-practice contexts such as faith-based schools and prepares them for further learning in these disciplines. See page 19.

Specialised master's courses enable students to acquire a deep and broad understanding of key themes and methodologies in one of the following specialisations: Pastoral Care, Philosophy and Spirituality.

Centre for Human Ageing

Catholic Theological College is currently working towards establishing a Centre for Human Ageing under the direction of Rev. Dr Laurence McNamara CM from Catholic Theological College and Rev. Dr Alan Niven from Stirling Theological College. Many centres around Australia focus on human ageing by concentrating on different aspects of 'active' ageing—the physical, psychological and social factors that influence the lives of ageing persons.

The centre, located at Catholic Theological College, will study human ageing from four perspectives: theology, spirituality, pastoral care and ethics. This is a unique undertaking in Australia and appears to have no equivalent overseas.

The appointment of Michelle Eastwood as research assistant has enabled the gathering of electronically detailed bibliographies in all four research strands. Work has begun on four bibliographical essays that will map the literature, providing a springboard for subsequent research, publication and education initiatives. A Master in Ageing is being developed to complement the current Graduate Certificate in Ageing.

In 2018, anticipating the formal establishment of the Centre for Human Ageing in late 2019, the University of Divinity included the "Human Ageing Project" as a new goal in its strategic plan. One of the first steps in this process involves engaging with the colleges of the University and with aged-care providers, to develop a network of interested parties. It is envisaged that the centre's board of governance will be drawn from this network of stakeholders. Six focus groups will also explore public policy issues in ageing and educational requirements as they relate to the project's four foundational themes.

Graduate Certificate in Ageing



Graduate Certificate in Teaching Religious Education

The Graduate Certificate in Teaching Religious Education fulfils the requirements of the Catholic Education Commission of Victoria Policy 1.7 Accreditation to Teach Religious Education in a Catholic School for teachers who already meet the VIT requirements for teacher registration. The course itself does not meet the requirements for VIT registration. The units in this course develop in dialogue with the Catholic tradition. The course provides graduates with an opportunity to engage with the Catholic biblical and theological tradition, and the principles and practices that form the basis for religious education. It provides an opportunity for students to develop and deepen their understanding of scripture, theology and religious education, so as to assist them in the preparation, implementation and evaluation of programs of religious education.

CECV Policy 1.6

Accreditation to Teach in a Catholic School

CTC provides teachers seeking accreditation to teach in a Catholic school with the opportunity to attend a broad range of lectures as auditors (without assessment). When approved by Catholic Education Melbourne, these lectures contribute to the areas specified in Part 2 of the policy, which requires a total of 50 hours' participation in professional development, according to the following:

•	Category A: child, adolescent and adult faith development	10 hours

- Category B: aims, objectives and rationale of the Catholic school 10 hours

The Catholic Dialogue School Today

Master of Education and Theology

The **Master of Education and Theology** is a coursework master's degree that offers teachers an opportunity to complement and extend their previous learning in education and religious education. The course consists of a combination of required and elective units, with a high degree of flexibility in the choice of units. The course duration is three semesters of full-time study or equivalent part-time study (credit available for a four-year teaching qualification and/or relevant postgraduate studies).

This course is offered by CTC and Yarra Theological Union in collaboration.

Entry requirements

- An undergraduate degree and
- a qualification recognised for teacher accreditation in Australia and
- two years of full-time teaching experience or part-time equivalent

Structure

The Master of Education and Theology consists of 216 points, comprised of:

- Leadership for Mission in a Catholic School (DR9663Y)
- 24 points in the discipline of Biblical Studies or the discipline of Systematic Theology
- 24 points in the discipline of Education or the discipline of Religious Education
- 24 points in the discipline of Education or the discipline of Religious Education or the discipline of Systematic Theology
- *either* a capstone unit of at least 24 points of study that integrates education and theology *or* a Minor Thesis of 16,000 words (48 points) on a related theme, as approved by the Associate Dean (Postgraduate and Research)
- further foundational, elective, praxis or capstone units

provided that at least 96 points of elective units are included.

Master of Education and Theology

Enhancing Catholic Institutional Identity

Learners will be introduced to the theological foundations, empirical frameworks and pedagogical perspectives of the Enhancing Catholic Schools Identity (ECSI) approach to the mission of church schools. They will develop skills and knowledge to interpret data from the ECSI surveys, and to use it to respond strategically to the challenges of educational leadership and faith formation in contemporary Australia. Offered in Semester 1 by CTC at St Francis Xavier College, 4 Beaconsfield Ave, Beaconsfield.

Leadership for Mission in a Catholic School

This unit will address the changing context in which Catholic schools operate and the import this has for school leaders. It will focus on the centrality of 'mission' in a context where the historical partnership between family, school and parish has diminished. The unit will then address the need for openness to the Spirit as we recontextualise by drawing on the wisdom of tradition, scripture, the Church and human experience, and as we negotiate the needs of an increasingly pluralist school community. It will also examine the responsibilities of those aspiring to or involved in leadership under the rubrics of educational, spiritual and managerial leadership. Offered in Semester 1 by Yarra Theological Union, 98 Albion Road, Box Hill.

Doing Theology: Engaging with the Catholic Theological Tradition

This unit will engage with the meaning and significance of central theological themes within the context of a secularising and pluralistic culture. The topics explored will relate to the discipline content of the Religious Education curriculum, with particular emphasis on developments in the Church's self-understanding during the Second Vatican Council through to today. These topics will be explored within the comprehensive worldview of creation and salvation expressed by the Catholic tradition. Offered in Semester 2 by CTC at St Francis Xavier College, 4 Beaconsfield Ave, Beaconsfield.

Interpreting Biblical Texts

This unit develops skills in the narrative-critical investigation of biblical texts, and in understanding how the narrative works to convey the theological perspective(s) of its author(s). The narratives will be the book of Exodus, and *either* two of the passion narratives and two of the resurrection narratives *or* two discrete sections of the Gospels chosen from the Lukan journey to Jerusalem (9:51–19:48) or Matthew's Sermon on the Mount (5:1–7:29) or Mark 8:22–10:52 or John's Cana to Cana (2:1–4:54). *Offered in Semester 2 by Yarra Theological Union, 98 Albion Road, Box Hill.*


