



## **CTC to offer Courses in Hong Kong**

After 12 months of negotiation, CTC and the University of Divinity have established a partnership with Caritas Institute of Higher Education (CIHE) in Hong Kong. CIHE is the only Catholic higher education provider registered in Hong Kong. As well as its own diploma and undergraduate awards, CIHE offers a number of awards through overseas universities. After approval by the education authorities in Hong Kong, CTC will offer the Graduate Certificate in Teaching Religious Education and Graduate Certificate in Theology in Hong Kong. These are the same awards that CTC already delivers off-site at Werribee, Geelong, Shepparton and, from 2016, Craigieburn. This will be the first time UDiv courses have been offered off-shore, and is a pilot program in the University's new strategic plan.



## Thanks and Farewell to Tony McCumstie

We have just received news that Tony McCumstie formally tendered his resignation effective from 18<sup>th</sup> December this year. Tony has been with the Library for more than twenty years, having been appointed Librarian at Clayton in 1993. The library was then the Corpus Christi Library but was situated adjacent to CTC and was available to all students. Tony was responsible for overseeing the mammoth task of transferring the very considerable library resources to their present home in 1999–2000. This change was effected with minimal disruption to anyone seeking access to the library: almost every volume ended up in exactly the correct place in the splendid new building. It was re-named the Mannix Library in memory of Daniel Mannix, third Archbishop of Melbourne (from 1917 to 1963). Tony, along with Rosalie Cotter and Lisa Gerber, has ensured library services are provided for the members of this College, the University and indeed for the many other folk who find this a great Catholic resource. It is all too easy to take such services for granted: resources are in place and easily accessed, problems can be readily sorted. We owe much to Tony and his team for keeping these ever-increasing resources in such fine order. Some of us will remember, others might find it startling, but the present library was once severely flooded though a malfunctioning fire extinguishing system. Tony and the team carried on quietly, ensuring uninterrupted services, despite the massive clean-up. Last year Tony stepped back from the responsibilities of librarian to less arduous tasks in the library, and he has now decided to take on still less exacting duties and will work in a couple of smaller theological libraries. We offer Tony warm thanks for many years of quiet, courteous and efficient service and wish him every blessing for the future.



## Dr Brenda Niall at Church History Research Day

On Saturday 31 October research students and friends and members of the Church History Department gathered at CTC to hear Dr Brenda Niall, author of several significant Australian biographies, most recently a biography of Melbourne's third and most famous archbishop Dr Daniel Mannix, in conversation with Fr Austin Cooper, followed by two sessions in which five higher degree students gave presentations on their areas of interest and research. The conversation with Dr Niall was most engaging, as well as useful for research students, as Fr Austin drew from Brenda her insights into historical research: about choosing topics, about managing gaps in the historical record, about finding an interpretative key, about appreciating a sense of place and of time. Brenda drew on many stories from her work to illustrate the points she made. Equally importantly, she spoke about how she goes about the process of writing after the research work is completed. Her advice was to 'keep it simple.' She described her technique as imagining that she is speaking to an interested friend about the person or period and simply telling them the story as she has come to understand it. Anyone who has read her work would agree that she has a gift for making history lively and accessible without compromising the complexity of either personality or circumstances.

## CTC Study Tour September 2015: The Experience of Catholic Culture



It was both a privilege and a blessing to walk in the way of the saints on the 2015 CTC Study Tour in September that took us to Ireland, Scotland, England and Italy.

We travelled to Glendalough and followed in the footsteps of the sixth-century monk, St Kevin, and journeyed to the enchanting island of Iona off the Scottish coast to immerse ourselves in the vision of monk and missionary, St Columba. We saw the humble beginnings in Dublin of Catherine McAuley, whose foundation of the Sisters of Mercy transformed the face of Catholicism in Australia.

In Dublin, London and Rome, Blessed John Henry Newman was like a familiar travelling companion inspiring us to think expansively about the Church's tradition, a living, breathing and dynamic reality.




We celebrated Mass in the chapel, once a small shop in York where Margaret Clitherow secretly arranged for Mass to be celebrated before dying a martyr's death. We saw the tiny hiding spot in the attic where Edmund Campion was sheltered before he too gave his life for the faith.

At Downside Abbey we praised God in prayer for raising up the Benedictine monk John Bede Polding, Australia's first resident bishop and our father in faith. Montecassino and Subiaco in Italy put us in touch with St Benedict and the cradle of western monasticism whose spirit continues to speak to searching hearts in our own day. Each of us was touched by the heroic courage, fidelity, perseverance and wonderful vision of these great saints who contributed mightily to the mission of the Church and transformed the culture of their time. As we walked the paths of these great saints, we started to realise that they were actually walking with us, encouraging us in the path of discipleship and shaping our vision according to the Gospel of Jesus.

In the joys and frustrations of the journey, in the talking and remembering, in the sharing of meals and in the moments of inspiration and illumination, the words of the liturgy and the tradition came to visit us in a moving way:

*In every age, you raise up men and women, outstanding in holiness, living witnesses of your unchanging love for us. They inspire us by their heroic lives and help us by their constant prayers to be the living signs of your saving power.*



## New Book by Dr Brian Boyle

On Tuesday 27 October, 65 friends and colleagues of Dr Brian Boyle gathered to celebrate the launch of Brian's book *A Friendly Guide to the Prophets*, the latest title in the very popular 'Friendly Guide' series. The College Master, Assoc. Prof. Shane Mackinlay welcomed the guests noting how gratified the College was to mark the scholarship of yet another member of the academic staff, and noting also that Dr Boyle's book is the third title in the 'Friendly Guide' series to be written by CTC staff members. He commended Fr Brian's book as a demonstration of the successful interplay between research and the ways in which it can inform teaching.




Dr Kris Sonek op, head of the Biblical Studies Department launched the book. He proposed *A Friendly Guide to the Prophets* as a convincing answer to the question 'Why should we, modern people, be interested in some obscure writings of the ancient prophets?' in that the book demonstrates the prophets' relevance and encourages the general reader 'to pick up something of the fire of these extraordinary people.'

Fr Kris noted three categories of reader to whom the book might especially appeal: 'the general reader who wants to take a sneak peek behind the curtain of esoteric biblical

exegesis, the university lecturer looking for a clear and comprehensive summary of prophetic literature, the student needing a practical tool to approach the complex and nuanced world of ancient Israelite prophecy.'

After giving a brief summary of the contents of the book, he suggested that it 'should inspire all of us to become modern prophets who do not simply accept reality as it is, but look for creative ways to change it for the better to make it just and fair.'

After the launch, refreshments were enjoyed by all as Fr Brian was congratulated individually by those present. - **Fr Stephen Bolling:** *Unless A Grain of Wheat Falls*


## Honorary Researchers

The following researchers have been recently appointed Honorary Researchers of CTC:



**Professor Richard Rymarz, Honorary Research Fellow.** Richard is currently Head of Religious Education and Director of Research at The Broken Bay Institute. He is Adjunct Professor at Australian Catholic University and Honorary Researcher of the Pastoral Research Office of the Australian Catholic Bishops' Conference. Formerly, he held the Peter and Doris Kule Chair in Catholic Religious Education, St Joseph's College, University of Alberta. His research interests include religious education and investigating the worldviews of teenagers and emerging adults in Catholic educational settings.

**Dr Greg Brown, Honorary Postdoctoral Associate.** Greg has extensive experience in practice and research in radiation oncology. In 2015 he graduated with the award of Doctor of Philosophy of the University of Divinity, with a dissertation titled *Cancer Storytelling: Revealing Prayer and Well-Being*, supervised by Prof. Austin Cooper and Dr Peter Price. Greg will continue his research in the area of storytelling and the use of metaphor in enhancing well-being.
